Trail Scenarios

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Leave No Trace Principles

- Plan Ahead and Prepare
- Travel on Durable Surfaces
- Dispose of Waste Properly
- Leave What You Find
- Respect Wildlife
- Be Considerate of Other Users



Trail Situation: Crossing Roads

- ► Have horse acclimated to traffic
- ▶ If riding in a group, have last rider come to front and stand on yellow line, blocking road and stopping traffic for others
- ► Have everyone else walk directly across the road
- Be prepared for honking, stones flying, etc.

Road Safety

- Observe all traffic directions
- Ride on the right side of the road
- Stop at stop signs



Road Safety

- Signal turns if there is someone behind you
- Ride single file when sharing roads or trails
- Must carry a light visible at least 200 ft to front and rear
- Wear reflective clothing







How to Pass a Dog on the Trail

- ▶ Let the dog and owner know you are coming
- Give the dog space, avoid approaching too closely
- Ask owner before petting the dog



Signs of Aggression in Dogs

- Becoming very still and rigid
- Guttural bark that sounds threatening
- Lunging forward or charging at the person with no contact
- Mouthing, as though to move or control the person, without applying significant pressure



Signs of Aggression in Dogs

- "Muzzle punch" (the dog literally punches the person with her nose)
- ▶ Growl
- Showing teeth
- Snarl (a combination of growling and showing teeth)
- Snap



Signs of Aggression in Dogs

- Quick nip that leaves no mark
- Quick bite that tears the skin
- Bite with enough pressure to cause a bruise
- ▶ Bite that causes puncture wounds
- Repeated bites in rapid succession
- Bite and shake



Signs of Fear in Dogs

- Flattened ears
- ▶ Tail tucked between the hind legs
- Cowering
- Lip licking
- Yawning
- Raised hair on the back of the neck
- Avoiding eye contact/averting the eyes
- Scratching self frequently (when he was not previously itchy)



Trail Scenarios

- Mud/Ruts
- Wet trails
- ▶ Bees watch out!





Trail Scenarios

- Bridges safe for all
- Sight Lines
- Safety
 - Lighting
 - ► Bring phone
 - Alone
 - ► Mace?



Trail Issues - Confrontations?

- Manure is Biodegradable
 - Parasites that infect horses not dangerous to humans
 - Free of microorganisms that infect humans
 - Does not contain Cryptosporidium or Giardia
 - ▶ Up to 80% water that evaporates or leaches into ground, rest is undigested plant parts
 - ► EPA excludes manure from solid waste regulations because it contains no hazardous chemicals and has no hazardous characteristics



Additional Trail Issues

- Horses can be taught to defecate off to the side, so can dogs
- Dog feces may contain toxoplasmosis, so can other domestic pets like cats would have to drink or ingest it such as by touching soil and not washing hands though!



Trail Situation: Crossing Streams

- Have horse negotiate water in ring
- Sandwich effect
- Look straight ahead
- Allow horse to touch water with hoof, sniff, take a drink, encourage it to go forward



Trail Situation: Going Uphill

- When going uphill, that changes horse's center of gravity
- Stay out of horse's way
- May need to use a breast collar to keep saddle in place
- Lean forward slightly to center your weight over the horse



Trail Situation: Going Downhill

- Again, when going downhill center of gravity will change
- ▶ Lean back slightly to center your weight over the horse
- Trust horse
- Look up and ahead



Trail Situation: Wildlife

- Sudden emergence of wildlife may cause a horse to spook
- ▶ Horse = prey animal
- Keep a bold horse at the lead of the ride
- Teach horse to recover rapidly through ground handling and exercises



Ideas for Practicing for Trail Situations

- One-rein stop
- Desensitization
- "Stick and String" Stacy Westfall
- Crossing foreign objects
- Introducing the exercise ball
- Introducing water hole



Trail Situations: Overview

- Slowing a horse down on the trail shows control and trust
- Let horse investigate unfamiliar objects remain patient
- Reward for success
- The more you put your horse in safe situations, the more it will have confidence in you as a rider




